





Thinking like a futurist could help the veterinary profession

From 1910 through 1930, the veterinary profession went through a time of great upheaval as automobiles displaced horses as the primary means of transportation and equine veterinarians were forced to adapt. Use of foresight tools can help prepare and control for similar upheaval in the future by examining the forces shaping the veterinary profession now and in the future.

Role of carbohydrates in the health of dogs

Despite the concerns of some owners, there appears to be no association between dietary carbohydrates and the development of obesity, diabetes mellitus, cancer, or adverse food reactions in dogs. Indeed, diet, and carbohydrates in particular, can be important in the treatment of these conditions.

Extralabel drug use in wildlife and game animals

Because few drugs have been approved by the US FDA for use in nondomestic animal species, extralabel drug use in wildlife and game animals is common. Veterinarians should be aware of the requirements outlined by AMDUCA for legal ELDU to safeguard the human food supply while continuing to promote the health and welfare of wildlife species.

Factors associated with dehiscence and mortality rates following gastrointestinal surgery in dogs

Multivariate analyses controlling for several patient factors revealed that dogs with an American Society of Anesthesiologists physical status ≥ 3 (vs < 3) were more likely to develop dehiscence after gastrointestinal surgery and that dogs with a high plasma lactate concentration were less likely to survive for at least 2 weeks than were other dogs.

Lung ultrasonography findings in dogs with various underlying causes of cough

Findings of a retrospective study suggested that in dogs with a clinical history of cough, lung ultrasonography could be diagnostically useful, particularly to help exclude the possibility of underlying cardiogenic pulmonary edema.

Frontal sinusitis in adult beef bulls: 18 cases (1999-2014)

In a retrospective case series involving 18 beef bulls with frontal sinusitis unrelated to dehorning, only 8 bulls had nasal discharge on initial evaluation, only 7 with a measured rectal temperature were febrile, and the most common owner complaint was nonspecific signs. All 14 bulls with follow-up information recovered fully.

Suprascapular nerve decompression for treatment of neuropathy in a bucking bull

A bucking bull that had developed lameness of a forelimb after exiting a rodeo chute was found via ultrasonography and electromyography to have suprascapular neuropathy. Surgical decompression of the affected nerve was successful, and by 4 months after the procedure, the bull had returned to bucking.

Suicides and deaths of undetermined intent among veterinary professionals from 2003 through 2014

An analysis of death records for 197 veterinary professionals and 5 veterinary students revealed that the most commonly identified mechanism of death was self-poisoning (46% [86/189]) and that 18 of 73 (25%) veterinarians died of pentobarbital poisoning specifically.
